HOW TO HELP YOUR CHILDREN ACHIEVE AT SCHOOL

The following suggestions are based on studies reviewed by John Hattie, Professor of Education, Auckland University.

- Do whatever you can to ensure your children go to school regularly and stay at school as long as possible.
- Listen to your children when they talk about what they are learning and doing at school. Encourage these discussions by showing interest.
- Ask about interesting and fun things that happen at school. Encourage children to share these things.
- Value effort, sticking to a task and learning the basics. Evidence shows children from families who value effort have a head start.
- Enjoy being involved with your children.


