DEALING WITH BULLYING

The Ministry of Education has recently given schools an extra resource to assist with bullying of any sort. This guide has a helpful definition that I am pleased to share below.

Bullying has four characteristics.

1. Bullying is deliberate. There is a clear intention to cause harm or hurt to another person.

- 2. Bullying involves a power imbalance. There actual, or perceived unequal relationship between the people involved which makes it difficult for the targeted person to stop the action.
- 3. Bullying is repetitive. It is not usually a oneoff. It is repeated over time with the threat of further incidents leading to fear and anxiety.
- 4. Bullying is harmful. There is physical or psychological harm and distress to the person being bullied.

Bullying is clearly unacceptable and should always be dealt with. If you have concerns that your child is being bullied at school, on line, or in any social setting please talk to us. We can always assist.

At Manurewa Central we endeavour to promote a positive, supportive and inclusive learning environment, however, do not hesitate to meet with us at any time.


