# Principal's News

## Cycle safety

The spring and summer months encourage children to become more active. Biking to school can be a great way for kids to get exercise, develop confidence and learn to share the road safely with motorists and other people on bikes. If you are considering a request for your child to ride a bike to school, we ask that you adhere to the following advice from the NZ Transport Agency:

- Ensure your child has the right cycling skills to get to school safely on a bike. Always ride with your child if they're under 10 and then continue until you're sure they have the skills and confidence to ride in traffic.
- Ensure your child's bike is the right size and fit.
- Cycle helmets must be worn and meet an approved standard. Before your child sets off on their bike, ensure the helmet is securely fastened, in good condition and not cracked or damaged. Make sure it's the right size, with little or no wobble when fitted.

## Attendance

You will be aware that school attendance is a Ministry priority, and Manurewa Central School are committed to increasing our regular attendance figures. If your child's attendance falls below 90%, their learning, progress, achievement and wellbeing is affected. The minimum expectation from the Ministry of Education is 90% regular attendance. Regular or unexplained absences are cause for concern and, in these circumstances, we will involve our attendance service to help families to return to regular attendance. If there is anything we can do to support you or your child before their attendance becomes an issue, please contact the school.

You can help us plan for next year by letting us know if your child <u>is not</u> returning in 2025 (apart from Year 6 of course). Also, if your child is going overseas and not returning for the first day of school on <u>Monday 3<sup>ed</sup></u> February you must inform the school in writing. Children who simply do not turn up at school may have to be removed from the school roll and consequently lose their place at school. We are here to help so please keep us informed.

## <u>Grounds</u>

You will have noticed the uneven surface as you enter school from the cenotaph gate as recent heavy rains have caused issues with the integrity of the pathway. We have raised our health and safety concerns with the Ministry who are currently looking at funding options to support upgrading of this area. In the meantime, we continue to make minor repairs until a permanent solution is reached. Please take care underfoot as you enter and leave school.
