Whānau Snapshot Survey Feedback

90% of responses believed confidence, self-esteem, and self-belief were the most important aspects of their child's social and emotional growth. We agree, and our school values programme and our learner profile - He Manu Rere supports the development of these attributes in our children. In 2022, the Ministry of Education released guidance for schools in support of wellbeing and the teaching and learning of mental health education. We decided to investigate additional resources to supplement our programmes, and at the beginning of Term 1 we became a 'Mitey' school.

What is Mitey?


Mitey https://www.mitey.org.nz/ supports schools to deliver a NZ specific, research driven approach to mental health education for Years 1 – 8. It provides children with age-appropriate knowledge, and the tools to safeguard and nurture their mental wellbeing and to help others to do the same. Learning is aligned to the NZ Curriculum and supported by integrated units of work. Mitey is deliv-

ered through ongoing free support and professional development from a coach dedicated to our school, alongside

unlimited access to a comprehensive online hub.

Mitey is a schoolwide approach to mental health education which requires engaging and partnering with the wider community. Great relationships with whanau and our community will provide the best possible outcomes for our tamariki. Through the course of the next two years we will be using the Mana Model as a framework to support meaningful engagement with whanau in this important mahi.

In Science we have been learning about light and how it reflects off certain materials and surfaces, as well as finding out what materials are transparent, translucent and opaque. For Senior Tabloids this week we had an 'Olympics' theme where we had 15 activities that involved running, jumping, throwing, pulling, crawling, dancing, climbing, cheering, balancing and when we could rest! An awesome day was had by all children, staff and parents. We have just begun learning about Matariki in preparation for the Hangi happening at school next week and the Matariki public holiday. Nikau

Nikau have been exploring, learning and comparing World War one and World War Two. We have looked at air and sea support and the role of soldiers and nurses. For Samoan language week our children made Kopai, they really enjoyed tasting it. The students have been enjoying their weekly Haka sessions and learning their waiata with Mrs Sauni. We have lots of fun learning planned for Matariki.

Tītoki

Talofa lava! Titoki has had a vibrant and culturally enriching term, from Samoa Language Week to insects, jigsaw puzzles and kites. Thanks to our wonderful student teacher, Miss Pele, the children learned the Samoan sasa dance, connecting with Samoan culture. They also explored the nalu, a traditional Samoan tattoo. The ongoing Teine Samoa mixed media project will soon be displayed, showcasing their artistic talent. Recently, the class made and flew their own kites, sharing their creations and newfound knowledge about kites. These activities highlight a term filled with cultural learning, creativity, and hands-on experiences.

Tī Kouka

It has been a busy time, but also very rewarding. Unfortunately, we have been hit by the winter bugs, resulting in many absences among both staff and students. A big thank you to all the parents who are supporting their children with their weekly spelling words, daily home reading, and maths homework. We can see the difference in the students who do this daily,

and it is making a significant positive impact on their learning. In our lessons, we have been enjoying learning about transforming shapes through reflection, translation, rotation, and enlargement. The students have also had fun manipulating shapes with tessellation and are in the process of creating some beautiful repeated patterns for an art piece. It has been a

very productive term for the children, with many really engaging with the writing process. It has been wonderful to see so many students foster a love of writing this term. We are now looking forward to our upcoming celebrations. Next week, we will be celebrating Matariki, and the following week we have a theatre trip planned based around Enid Blyton's series The Famous Five, as a reward for all the hard work the students have put in this term.

Kauri

Senior School students took part in an Olympic Tabloid Sports Day this Wednesday. It was a fantastic day, and Kauri students had a great time participating with students from Nikau and Rimu Pods in assigned country groups. All the students took part in 14 different events, including decathlon, fencing, hurdles, and relays. Every student demonstrated excellent portsmanship and had a wonderful day with their peers! The group representing the Philippines won gold in our final tally of scores. This group showed outstanding sportsmanship and helpfulness throughout the day. The Cook Islands came second, and Scotland came third. The points were very close between the top 5 teams. We cannot wait until the next Tabloid Sports Day!

Tōtara

We have been working hard in Totara Pod. So far this term we have learned about measuring objects by length and height and are now looking at shapes, what the 2D shape name is, how many sides/edges and corners it has and what makes it similar or different to other shapes. We have been learning to recognise teen numbers, order numbers forwards and backwards and work out simple addition and subtraction problems. We are learning to write a sentence by recording some letter sounds and words that we know well now by ourselves. We have also been trying really hard to learn the words on our coloured word cards as we get very excited to move to a new coloured word card. In PMP (Perceptual Motor Programme -Gross and Fine Motor Skills) we have been working on balance and coordination. Our favourite activities in PMP have been landing like a motorbike when jumping off high things and keeping the balloon up in the air with fly swats. What a fun term we are having!

Kōwhai

We celebrated Samoan Language Week in week 5 by creating tapa designs - looking at a variety of patterns we can use to create a masterpiece. We also learned about three types of 'ula; 'ula, 'ula fala and 'ula lole. Some of us had the opportunity to make an 'ula lole/lolly necklace and take it home to share with our families. We have been learning the te reo Māori translations for a range of feelings. Students participated in a workshop exploring a variety of synonyms for harikoa (happy), pouri (sad), and riri (angry). They were able to express times they may have felt this way. Kowhai is looking forward to Matariki and preparing and sharing a hangi as a pod.
